



# Annual Report 2011

Multnomah Bar Association (MBA) was founded in 1906 as a voluntary, nonprofit, professional association of lawyers and judges in the Portland metropolitan area. From the beginning, the MBA has provided metro-area lawyers with a forum for collegiality, judicial stewardship, continuing education, professional and business development and law-related community service. The mission of the MBA is to promote justice, service, professionalism, education and leadership to its members and to the community. The organization focuses its efforts and activities in support of this mission in three key areas: service to the public through stewardship of the justice system, service to MBA members and service to the profession. The MBA has 4,616 members, up from 4,440 the year before. Members are primarily lawyers from the Portland metropolitan area; the remaining members are judges from the state and federal courts, lawyers outside the Portland area and non-attorney staff working in law-related positions. The MBA Young Lawyers Section (YLS) serves members who are 36 years old and under or in practice six or fewer years, whichever is later.

## From the President

The MBA had a productive year in 2010–2011 under the leadership of President Sarah Crooks and our Executive Director Judy Edwards. Despite the fact that the economic recovery has yet to materialize, the MBA remains financially healthy and continues to provide service to its more than 4,600 members.

Most of the credit for the MBA's fiscal health and member services goes to Judy and the MBA staff—Guy Walden, Kathy Modie, Carol Hawkins, Ryan Mosier and Pamela Hubbs. The MBA also is fortunate to have dedicated members who serve on MBA committees or volunteer their time and skills when requested to do so.

Under the auspices of the Group Health Committee, the MBA continues to offer health plans at competitive prices in a turbulent market. The CLE Committee developed innovative, affordable seminars on a variety of topics of interest to our members. The CourtCare Campaign successfully raised funds for the operation of the childcare facility in the courthouse. The Judicial Screening Committee continued its important function of reviewing and evaluating lawyers who would like to be either permanent or *pro tem* judges in Multnomah County. We also benefited from the efforts of the Court Liaison Committee, the Equality Committee, the Professionalism Committee and the Membership Committee.

Our members also enjoyed popular social events such as WinterSmash, golf tournaments and outings planned by our Golf Committee, and the Annual Meeting.

Finally, I would like to make special note of two things: first, this year the MBA was able to make a significant contribution to the Volunteer Lawyers Project to assist in providing legal representation to those who cannot afford it; and second, to the work done by Sarah Crooks and Judy Edwards with the Multnomah County Chair and the County's Commissioners, to move forward plans for a safe courthouse. Thanks to them and to all our volunteers for the MBA's successes and accomplishments.

# Multnomah Bar Foundation

Promoting community understanding of our justice system



The MBF is a charitable non-profit. In its six years, the foundation has given \$255,651 in grants to nonprofit organizations for their civic education and participation programs and to create a new video series on democracy issues. (see MetroEast below)

**The Bus Project Foundation** received \$22,000 to register and educate voters, train future community leaders and engage high schoolers.

**The Classroom Law Project** has been granted \$80,700 for their *We the People* program, which teaches students about the Constitution and Bill of Rights and the CLP's Youth Summits which involve over 1,200 students annually.



**Elders in Action** received \$24,000 to provide civic education to adults age 60 and over as part of its Civic Education Awareness Project; their broadcast presentations reach 600,000.

**YOUTHFILM Project** received \$7,000 for their annual student filmmaking contest planned by the YLS, which focuses on the civics topic chosen each year by the ABA.



**Sponsors Organized to Assist Refugees (SOAR)** was granted \$5,000 for their voter education project which includes monthly classes to teach newly naturalized citizens about the voting system and civic participation.

**League of Women Voters Portland and Oregon** received

\$14,196 for their Student Leadership Initiative, mock elections, classes on the election process and the importance of voting and their Voters' Guide, which provides nonpartisan information and a fast fact flyer on Oregon taxes.



**MetroEast Community Media** has received \$8,500 to produce a series of informational public service announcements on civic issues and a public affairs show, "The Courts and You/Legal Logic." The local cable access



station will receive \$50,000 to produce the MBF's Signature Project, a civic education video series for statewide broad-

cast on cable access stations, posted on YouTube and various Web sites and distributed to schools statewide. The first two videos will be released this fall.

**Multnomah CourtCare**

The free childcare program serves families that must be in court and do not have childcare. Children between the ages of six weeks and five years are served by certified caregivers provided

## Pro Bono Volunteer Lawyers Project

The Volunteer Lawyers Project (VLP) is the pro bono program of the Multnomah County Office of Legal Aid Services of Oregon. Its mission is to provide high-quality legal services to low-income Oregonians who otherwise would not receive legal representation. VLP pairs volunteer attorneys with low-income clients and coordinates the OSB Debtor-Creditor Section Bankruptcy Clinic, Domestic Violence Project, Pro Se Assistance Project, Senior Law Project and Legal Aid Night Clinic. Additionally, the VLP posts cases on the ProBonoOregon Listserv, an email placement project.

In its 30<sup>th</sup> year of operation, VLP is one of the longest-running pro bono programs in Oregon. It was founded in 1981 as an MBA project, but merged with the Multnomah County legal aid program in 1996. Pro bono attorneys provide an array of legal services, from brief advice to contested litigation. Over 2,200 clients were served last year, with 394 volunteer attorneys reporting 7,000 hours of pro bono service. We know that the actual number of pro bono hours is significantly higher. The VLP receives essential financial support through the MBA dues check-off program and the MBA Golf Committee's Annual Championship Tournament.

### Multnomah County Courthouse

MBA leaders continue to work with the county on improving the downtown courthouse.

Architects studied the feasibility of renovating the courthouse while maintaining substantial court operations. They found that a complete seismic, security and systems upgrade could be done over a four and a half to six year period. A remodel could potentially add two to six courtrooms.

Whether the county remodels or builds a new 21<sup>st</sup> century court facility, funding seems elusive despite attempts at identifying multiple funding sources. MBA volunteers will continue to participate in the county's and state's efforts to make state court facilities up-to-date, safe and efficient. Construction is underway for a new East County Courthouse, with the expected completion in March 2012. ### MBA Social and Networking Events

This year's members had several opportunities to meet and get acquainted with their colleagues. The "Absolutely Social – A Grape Escape," featured competitive blind wine tasting and was attended by 250 members. "WinterSmash," a family evening of bowling and pizza, was attended by 300 and it raised \$20,000 for Multnomah CourtCare. Thirty-four sponsors generously supported the event.

For the seventh year in a row, Harrang Long Gary Rudnick, the King Pin Sponsor, underwrote the evening's food and beverage.

Over 400 people attended the MBA annual meeting and judges reception. Other social events included a summer barbeque, Bench, Bar and Bagel breakfast, night at the spa, strength and conditioning class, First Thursday reception with diversity-related bars and a social and tour of the "Allure of the Automobile" at the Portland Art Museum.

### **Group Health Insurance—Bruce Thompson, Chair**

- ♦ Monitored a low-cost, quality group health insurance program for MBA members.
- ♦ Initiated a new life insurance plan with ING.
- ♦ The plan covers over 2,200 members and their staff, plus dependents.

### **Judicial Screening—Cedric Brown, Chair**

- ♦ Screened 13 judicial pro tem candidates and made recommendations to the presiding judge.

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## **MBA Financial Report**

McDonald Jacobs Accountants and Consultants conduct a financial review each year and provide a consolidated report of the MBA and MBF financial activities. The organizations’ fiscal years are the calendar year. The 2010 reviewed statements showed total combined assets for the MBA and MBF, including cash, receivables, health insurance premiums, prepaid expenses and net equipment at \$1,865,553. Not including health insurance premiums, the combined assets of the MBA and MBF were \$1,053,074.

MBA revenues for 2010 were \$870,970 and expenses were \$823,143. Approximately \$438,420 of revenues came from dues, representing 50% of the total. Non-dues revenue comes primarily from seminars, affinity programs, committee activities, events, sponsorships and newsletter advertising. MBA dues for 2011 are \$110 for regular members. Dues are waived for new admittees and full-time judges and are reduced for second year, retired and associate members. Dues remain the lowest nationally for voluntary bars of similar size.
